About Historic Congressional Cemetery



ith its first burial in 1807, Historic Congressional Cemetery is among the oldest institutions in Washington, DC, and is the final resting place of over 70,000 individuals. Their stories are American history in microcosm, all in 35 acres of the nation's capital. Still an active burial ground, it is the only place in Washington where individuals can be buried at a site directly on Pierre L'Enfant's 18th century city plan.

Historic Congressional Cemetery was designated a National Historic Landmark in 2011 and continues to build upon the legacy of over 200 years of American history. The cemetery is administered by the nonprofit Association for the Preservation of Historic Congressional Cemetery and owned by Christ Church + Washington Parish. The association is constantly striving to maintain the historic, cultural, and aesthetic qualities of this natural landscape along the Anacostia River.

- Hundreds of volunteers each year help preserve the cemetery and further its nonprofit mission.
- Burial sites are still available to the general public.
- Notable burials include John Philip Sousa, the March King; Mathew Brady, the Father of Photojournalism; Elbridge Gerry, signer of the Declaration of Independence; and Belva Lockwood, the first woman to legally run for president.
- Veterans from across American history are buried in the cemetery.
- We promote innovative and sustainable practices, such as beekeeping, a dog-walking program, and are the only cemetery in Washington, DC, that provides green burials.
- Congressional Cemetery is open to the public every day from dawn to dusk. We welcome visitors to walk around the grounds and explore the cemetery's rich history and environmental beauty.

75 headstones were restored and/or cleaned.


10,746 people attended events generating \$173,827 in income.

Accomplishments and Highlights

Education

The history of Congressional Cemetery is the story of us. The various headstones, memorials, and gravesites, and the stories associated with them form a one-of-a-kind portal into the American past. 2023 marked another successful year of sharing the stories of our interred residents with the community and respectfully celebrating their legacy through our educational programs. This year:

- Our dedicated docents provided 79 public and private tours to an audience of 1,412 visitors.
- •We partnered with local historical organizations, historians, and scholars for a vairety of programs, including the Cemetery Speaker Series, a new 2023 program series. Participating organizations included Howard University, Yale University, Ford's Theatre, and the U.S. Capitol.
- Working closely with our docent corps, we introduced new guided and self-guided walking tours, including Founding the Federal City, Congressional Unleashed (Pets), LGBTQ/Black History, and more.
- We conducted educational programs in coordination with several organizations including the United States Senate, Yale University, Howard University, the Smithsonian Associates, the Ward 6 Democrats, Potomac Lodge 5, among others.

Environmental Stewardship

Congressional Cemetery continued to focus our efforts on the landscape that provides comfort and clean air to our visitors. We prioritized native plantings and mitigating safety issues on the grounds. This year:

- The Adopt-a-Plot program expanded, with a total of 101 plots adopted by 73 volunteer gardeners.
- As part of Casey Trees' mission to re-canopy DC, 20 new trees were planted.
- A renovation of the East End introduced new material and debris storage.
- Congressional Cemetery welcomed a new Horticulture and Grounds Manager.
- Eagle Scouts completed a Blue Bird Conservation Trail Project.
- Our bee pollinator partnership with DC Beekeepers Alliance flourished, resulting in a successful honey harvest and sale which sold out in 8 minutes.
- The cemetery continued to be a supporter and proponent of green burials. As the only cemetery allowing green burials in DC, we honored the final disposition wishes of dozens of individuals and their families.



Community Engagement

2023 was vibrant and prolific for cemetery events and programming. Hundreds of visitors and community members gathered together at the cemetery, helping celebrate life, legacy, and community. 10,746 people attended events at HCC, generating a record \$173,827 in revenue.

- Soul Strolls recorded its highest attendance and revenue ever. 1,694 visitors strolled with interred residsents who met untimely ends, generating \$83,432 in sales.
- Our Summer of Surreal Tim Burton themed Cinematery events saw 1,070 visitors attend, generating \$13,145 in sales.
- Dead Man's Run 5K passed for another lap, as 534 runners broke a sweat on our grounds, generating \$19,546.
- The annual John Philip Sousa birthday was a well attended affair. The Marine Band performed some of Sousa's iconic music for a live crowd of approximately 150 people, with an audience of thousands joining by live stream.
- Death Literacy Programs such as Death Doula Days and Death Cafe thrived, bringing in hundreds of indviduals for weekly programs and discussions.
- •Partnerships returned and expanded, working with organizations such as DC Frontrunners, Fulcrum Residential, Special Olympics DC, Ford's Theatre, among others.

Historic Preservation

Our commitment to protecting Historic Congressional Cemetery as a National Historic Landmark was made possible this year thanks to the efforts of a professional conservator, our Director of Conservation, and the sweat equity of our volunteers. The work of these individuals made possible:

- The cleaning of dozens of headstones, including 9 cenotaphs.
- An expanded partnership with professional conservator, Devlin McDonald, who repaired 83 of our most dangerous stones for \$84.800.
- A records audit to help consolidate the historic records of the cemetery with more modern site sales and burials continued, with active rectification scheduled throughout 2024-2025.
- •Vital repairs and maintenance to our historic chapel totaling \$6,734.
- •The installation of new safety lighting on the main path totaling \$20,000.
