"A Tree Walk Through History"

A new half-mile nature walk invites visitors to stroll the arboreal trail and learn how the cemetery's trees help tell the story of this sacred ground. The tour highlights witness trees, notable memorials, shady tree-tunnels through Kwanzan cherries, Chinese elms, and American hornbeam allées, and a cluster of newly-planted linden trees that form a "tree-henge" around the *Circle of Life*.

- Identify, record, and map a diverse collection of tree species
- Label designated trees with common and scientific names
